

Reflecting Back and Looking Forward

2023 was a year of both reflection and looking forward. The \$23.6M in grants made is an all time high watermark for PVF in giving. Cumulatively we have contributed \$232M into our communities.

We take the time to reflect that Bill Somerville, our founder, retired after founding PVF 33 years ago. Bill has transformed and shaped what philanthropy could and should be. And we honor and keep aloft the flame of his 'find them and fund them' grassroots philanthropy principals.

Yet, as we peer into the future, though things remain the same, everything is also different. The need remains great. The need for dignity amongst an ocean of hunger, poverty, lack of shelter and opportunity, is even greater today. But so are entirely unforeseen and unimagined challenges and opportunities like the waves of transformation that AI is bringing to our shores. PVF is already making our first grants into AI education for underrepresented communities, and universal basic income through a pilot program for very low-income new mothers in San Mateo County.



We aspire to transform philanthropy and make it more responsive and collaborative to meet the needs of our community. We identify needs that can be met with philanthropic support, and then we devise program ideas to help tackle the issues head on. From this drive to address unmet needs came the idea of immediate-response grants, in which we provide funds within a 48-hour turnaround. We have established a variety of immediate-response grant programs, benefiting teachers as well as social workers and juvenile court judges who work with youth in foster care.
